JCVI Cohort 2: Frontline social care worker SOP

Scope and Eligibility

All frontline social care workers in scope

This includes:

- Those working in long-stay residential and nursing care homes or other long-stay facilities where rapid spread is likely to following introduction of infection and cause high morbidity and mortality
- Social care staff directly involved in the care of their patients or clients
- Others involved directly in delivering social care such that they and vulnerable patients are at increased risk of exposure

Scope

All frontline social care workers

Excluding those in cohort 1

Those who work in CQC registered residential settings for older adults

Eligibility

Working directly with people clinically vulnerable to COVID -19

Eligible frontline social care workers

Staff who provide direct care closely and regularly to those who are clinically vulnerable to COVID-19.

People clinically vulnerable to COVID-19 are included in any of the JCVI Cohorts 1-9 because these groups, taken together, represent around 99% of preventable mortality from COVID-19.

- Residents/carers in a care home for older adults
- 2. all those >80 years of age and frontline health and social care workers
- 3. all those 75 years of age and over
- 4. all those 70 years of age and over and clinically extremely vulnerable individuals
- 5. all those 65 years of age and over
- Individuals aged 16 years to 64 years with underlying health conditions which put them at higher risk of serious disease and mortality and unpaid carers
- 7. all those 60 years of age and over
- 8. all those 55 years of age and over
- 9. all those 50 years of age and over

JCVI Cohort 2: Frontline SCW SOP Eligibility: Local Oversight

- Local Authority Directors of Adult Social Care have ultimate responsibility for confirming eligibility across staff groups within the local authority area
 - The LA DASS should work with Directors of Children's Services to confirm eligibility within the childrens' workforce

Cohort 2 should include:

All frontline social care workers directly working with people clinically vulnerable to COVID
19 who need care and support irrespective of where they work (for example in people's own homes, day centres, care homes for working age adults or supported housing); whether they care for clinically vulnerable adults or children; or who they are employed by (for example local government, NHS private sector or third sector employees)

Cohort 2 excludes:

- Administrative, ancillary or management staff who do not have any direct contact with adult clients or children.
- Unpaid carers (as included in cohort 6)

Cohort 2 excludes:

 Social care workers who work with children under the age of 16 <u>EXCEPT</u> for when the social care worker works with children who are clinically extremely vulnerable (CEV) to COVID*

^{*} Definitions for clinically extremely vulnerable groups can be found here. It covers those on the Shielded Patient List or with specific conditions which are listed.

JCVI Cohort 2: Frontline SCW SOP Eligibility: Examples



The table below offers advice to support the Local Authority Directors of Adult Social Care for making decisions on eligibility, noting that any decision should be based on there being clear evidence that the frontline social care workers are providing direct care closely and regularly to those who are clinically vulnerable to COVID-19.

Ohsite ancillary includes: staff who may have social contact with patients but are not directly involved in patient care. This group includes receptionists, ward clerks, porters and cleaners

JCVI Cohort 2: Frontline SCW SOP Definitions of CEV



There are 2 ways you may be identified as clinically extremely vulnerable:

- 1. You have one or more of conditions listed below, or
- 2. Your clinician or GP has added you to the Shielded Patient List because, based on their clinical judgement, they deem to you be at higher risk of serious illness if you catch the virus.

People with the following conditions are automatically deemed clinically extremely vulnerable: · solid organ transplant recipients · people with specific cancers: · people with cancer who are undergoing active chemotherapy · people with lung cancer who are undergoing radical radiotherapy · people with cancers of the blood or bone marrow such as leukemia, lymphoma or myeloma who are at any stage of treatment · people having immunotherapy or other continuing antibody treatments for cancer · people having other targeted cancer treatments that can affect the immune system, such as protein kinase inhibitors or PARP inhibitors · people who have had bone marrow or stem cell transplants in the last 6 months or who are still taking immunosuppression drugs people with severe respiratory conditions including all cystic fibrosis, severe asthma and severe chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) people with rare diseases that significantly increase the risk of infections (such as severe combined immunodeficiency (SCID), homozygous sickle cell disease) people on immunosuppression therapies sufficient to significantly increase risk of infection problems with your spleen, for example splenectomy (having your spleen removed) adults with Down's syndrome · adults on dialysis or with chronic kidney disease (stage 5) women who are pregnant with significant heart disease, congenital or acquired

JCVI Cohort 2: Frontline SCW SOP Specific Queries



LA Directors of Adult Social Care have responsibility for confirming eligibility of staff groups within the local authority area. The table below offers advice to support this, noting it is not exhaustive and that any decision should be based on their being clear evidence that they are frontline social care workers who are providing, or highly likely to be providing, direct care for people who are clinically vulnerable to COVID-19 such that social distancing is not always possible.
